Sustainable Development Goal 1

End poverty in all its forms everywhere



1. Brief Description

In September 2015, the international community adopted the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development issued by the United Nations General Assembly. The 2030 Agenda represents a global ambitious framework that directs all societies towards a sustainable path in order to end poverty, hunger, inequality and climate degradation, enable better access to healthcare and education, and build peaceful and equitable societies. It comprises 17 sustainable development goals (SDGs) and 169 sub-targets which serve as a global reference point for the "transformation of our world", towards a fairer and more peaceful future (United Nations [UN], 2015).

The Arab Academy for Science, Technology and Maritime Transport (AASTMT) complies with the vision for the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. Following is a Policy Statement for SDG1 No Poverty: End poverty in all its forms everywhere.

2. Scope

This policy statement applies to all students, staff members and employees in all colleges, institutes and centres in all campuses at the AASTMT.

3. Aims of the Policy

This policy statement aims to present the strategies and actions taken by the AASTMT in order to contribute to eradicating poverty. It also provides the performance indicators and the required measures for SDG1 No Poverty. The policy statement has been developed in accordance with 2030 the Agenda for Sustainable Development: definition of SDG1, targets and performance indicators. It will be considered as a reference point for contributing to SDG1.

4. Introduction

This policy statement was developed as per reference to policies adopted by a number of centres of responsibility at the AASTMT:

- Deanery of Student Affairs
- Deanery of Admission and Registration
- Vice Deaneries of Training and Community Service
- Community Service and Continuing Education Centre
- International Agreements and Cooperation Centre

5. Policy Statement

In accordance with the tenets of SDG1 No Poverty, the AASTMT is committed to achieving each of the following:

- providing financial aid to students so that they have enough money to meet their basic needs. Basic needs include food, water, accommodation, clothing, sanitation, education, healthcare, internet. In this context we are following the World Bank definition, defining poverty in absolute terms.
- admitting students from backgrounds where poverty is a factor, and ensuring that
 these students have the support necessary to complete their studies. AASTMT
 should also have a commitment to supporting students experiencing poverty in low
 or lower-middle income countries across the world.
- as stewards of significant resources, supporting the wider community in tackling poverty. These are programmes and/or activities designed or intended to relieve poverty. These programmes can be community-led but they will be supported by the university.

Vice Deans for Student Affairs will be responsible for ensuring that students are given financial aid; Vice Deans for Training and Community Service will be responsible for developing anti-poverty university programmes and anti-poverty community programmes.

6. Definition

The UN explains: "Extreme poverty rates have fallen by more than half since 1990. While this a remarkable achievement, one-in-five people in developing regions still live on less than \$1.90 a day. Millions more make little more than this daily amount and are at risk of slipping back into extreme poverty."

7. Roles and Responsibilities

- Deanery of Student Affairs: Student Support Department giving support to students who are struggling financially
- Deanery of Admission and Registration: admitting students who are below 20% of household income
- Vice Deaneries of Training and Community Service: providing anti-poverty community programmes
- Community Service and Continuing Education: providing training programmes to the public
- Agreements and International Agreements Centre: making agreements with charity institutions

8. Objectives

In order to contribute to achieving the primary goal of SDG1 which is eradicating poverty in all its forms everywhere, the AASTMT is going to fulfill the following objectives:

- 1. Increasing the proportion of students receiving financial aid
- 2. Developing university anti-poverty programmes
- 3. Developing community anti-poverty programmes

9. Strategies to achieve each objective

Increasing the proportion of students receiving financial aid

Within the framework of social responsibility, the AASTMT plays a supportive role for the parents who are struggling financially and are unable to fulfill the academic merits. This type of support

encourages many Egyptian families to enroll their sons in the Academy so that they are offered financial aid. Non-Egyptian students are provided with services related to obtaining legal residency in the country.

The Student Support department contributes to solving students' and parents' financial problems and submitting them to the AASTMT President with some recommendations in addition to forming grants and discounts committees at the beginning of each semester.

- 5. Agreements and International Cooperation Centre makes agreements with charity institutions.

- Low-income students have the support necessary to complete their studies.
- Programmes and/or activities designed or intended to relieve poverty are developed. These programmes can be community-led but they are supported by the AASTMT.
